

Get Back to Nature at the Hagerman National Wildlife Refuge

Are you looking for a one-of-a-kind adventure that is almost right in your backyard? The Hagerman National Wildlife Refuge on the southern coast of Lake Texoma is one of my favorite hidden jewels in the area, though there are many others. It's a great spot to explore nature, with plenty of hiking paths, places to launch your kayak or canoe, and areas for bird watching and fishing. Located at 6465 Refuge Road, Sherman, TX 75092, the Hagerman National Wildlife Refuge Visitor Center is easily accessible from both North Texas and Southern Oklahoma due to its strategic location. Because of this, it's a great day excursion for groups and individuals of all ages.

Bring binoculars and a picnic, and take advantage of everything HNWR has to offer. Additionally, now is the best time of year to see a variety of species in the Refuge, including bald eagles that are nesting from now until March.

The Friends of Hagerman sponsor several events for the public to attend. We would like to share some of our upcoming favorites with you. The following occur at the Hagerman National Wildlife Refuge Visitor Center, unless stated otherwise.

ACTIVITIES AND EVENTS:

Refuge Rocks for Kids: Saturday, February 15th, at 10 am. Refuge Rocks – Scat Tracks and Signs. The wild animals at Hagerman National Wildlife Refuge are rarely seen. So, how do we know they live here? On Saturday, February 15, come out to the refuge to develop your tracking skills by examining and interpreting the indirect evidence animals leave behind. We will be exploring scat and tracks. We'll learn how to get started identifying tracks, scat, and other animal signs when hiking on our trails. We'd love to see what you find while exploring the outdoors today! Studying what an animal leaves behind is a great way to learn about the lifestyle and habits of local wildlife.

Let's learn about scat, tracks, and signs with a short lesson, some fun games and activities, as well as a fun craft! Come join us on February 15 for a free class for youth ages 5–10.

Butterfly Garden Stroll: Restarting Spring 2025. The garden is free of charge and open to the public from sunrise to sunset every day of the year.

Annual Meeting: Save the date to attend the annual meeting of the Friends of Hagerman NWR Foundation. The event will be held on March 16th at 2:00 pm at the Visitor Center. The 2024 Board of Directors will present their activities and accomplishments of the past year, and board members for the next term will be elected. The public is invited to attend, but only current Friends of Hagerman members may vote for board members.

HIKING TRAILS:

Hiking Haller's Haven Trail is a favorite. This 2.7-mile partial loop trail offers a great view of the refuge at the top of an easy hill. Along the way you'll first pass Picnic Pond, then Dead Woman's Pond, which is often teeming with wildlife. This trail is relatively easy.

Crow Hill Trail is a ³/₄ mile, quick, and moderate-level excursion that is shady, short, but a bit steep, offering a fabulous view of the lake.

Harris Creek Trail is a great trail for bird lovers. It offers a 0.25 ADA Trail, plus 1.25 – and 2.25 – mile loops. This is the most popular trail, with several ponds and a photo blind.

As spring break approaches and the weather warms up, Hagerman National Wildlife Refuge has a number of enjoyable and cost-free activities the whole family may take part in. It is an excellent method to reconnect with nature and provides a simple vacation.

There are roughly 100 different types of tulips available overall (early, mid, and late-flowering varieties). Throughout the picking season, varieties become available at different times. Texas-Tulips has an enormous selection of hues and forms, so there is something for everyone. Plan to fall head over heels in love with these gorgeous tulips because they are just too good to resist!

- On the field, there is a picking basket that you can use to gather your tulips to purchase.

MONASTERIES SUSPENDED IN THE CLOUDS

I was enthralled with the beauty and felt thankful for everything as I gazed out over Meteora's magnificent landscape. Somehow, I felt like I was suspended between two realms, gazing at the otherworldly landscape while surrounded by a serene, peaceful atmosphere. Like a youngster witnessing something for the first time, drinking in the energy and digesting the feeling of awe and wonder, it was truly a memorable experience.

The word Meteoro in the Greek vocabulary translates into something that remains suspended in midair or a thing that floats in the sky. Perhaps that is what drew the hermits originally to the area. Solitude, closeness to God, and safety.

Meteora is a magnificent fusion of spirituality and the natural world. On my visit, the air was filled with a fine mist, and the enchanted, needle-like rock formations erupting out of the ground were contrasted by the soft fog partially obscuring them. Undoubtedly, I had entered a magnificent snow globe environment, enhanced by rocks covered in longgrowing lichens and lush green moss, which was a fascinating juxtaposition to the glistening snow that continued to blanket the area.

The extraordinarily perched monasteries scattered across the peaks of the vertical rock formations enhanced the already wonderful environment and created an incredibly stunning sight. Without divine assistance, it is nearly hard to believe that ordinary people could have created such marvels.

Monks and hermits built the monasteries to be closer to God. The first small chapel was constructed in 1160 AD by hermits that lived in naturally formed caves. On Sundays they would come down to worship, enjoy fellowship, and gather supplies. Then retreat back to their solitary caves. It wasn't until the 14th century that the first monks arrived and built 24 Eastern Orthodox monasteries between the 14th and 16th centuries.

Today six of them are still in use and can be visited, including the Monastery of Great Meteoron, Roussanou/St. Barbara, Varlaam, St. Stephens, St. Nicholas Anapausas, and the Monastery of the Holy Trinity. During our visit we viewed all six of them but entered Roussanou/St. Barbara, St. Nicholas Anapausas, and St. Stephens. The monasteries are all part of the UNESCO World Heritage Site, and the region is part of the Natura 2000 Ecological Zone.

The monasteries were relatively unknown until the area was featured in the 1981 James Bond movie "For Your Eyes Only" and then in the 2014 hit "300: Rise of an Empire. But if you think it looks recently familiar, it was featured in "The Game of Thrones" as the kingdom of Dorne.

Prepare to be amazed by the vibrant frescoes that adorn the churches' interior walls as you enter. Spend some time appreciating the beautiful intricacies, some of which are the finest examples of Greek post–Byzantine art.

When you visit, wear sturdy walking shoes, and be prepared to climb between 150 and 300 steps per monastery. There are several inclines along the way as well. Once you enter the monastery, be prepared for even more stairs. There are no elevators or any type of easy access for disabled people or people with limited mobility.

The weather can vary due to the altitude, so layers are recommended. Women must wear skirts and cover their shoulders. I wore a skirt, but it was easy to borrow or rent skirts before entering. Men are not allowed to enter wearing shorts or exposing their calves or sleeveless shirts, so dress appropriately. Each monastery cost \in 5.00 to enter and needed to be paid for in cash. They do not allow photography inside the monasteries, but you can purchase books with images in the small gift shops.

While there are several ways to get to Meteora, we chose a tour from Athens. It was the most straightforward way for us and met our needs the best. Be prepared for a long day. The bus ride is four hours in each direction. We left around 7:00 in the morning and arrived back at our drop-off point around 10:30 that evening. A rustic but delicious lunch was included, as well as all transportation. Our tour guide was very knowledgeable and was able to answer all of our questions.

You should consider visiting Meteora if you want to experience adventure, spiritual awakening, a return to nature, a demonstration of human perseverance, architectural wonder, or any combination of these. It is enthralling, fulfilling, and breathtaking. Meteora itself is a place that insists that we remain enthralled and alive with everything we look at and appreciate.






Denton County AgriLife Extension Celebrates a Successful 2024

Growth, Education, & Volunteer Impact Shine Across Programs

In 2024, Denton County AgriLife Extension continued to make a profound impact on the community, showcasing remarkable growth, successful programs, and exceptional volunteer contributions. With over one million residents in the county, AgriLife Extension's dedicated staff and volunteers worked tirelessly to reach as many individuals as possible, leaving a lasting mark on the lives of youth, families, and agricultural producers.

4-H Program: Empowering the **Leaders of Tomorrow**

Denton County 4-H grew to 372 members and 82 volunteers across 10 active clubs this year. Representing the county year-round, 4-H youth excelled in livestock competitions and developed skills in Food & Nutrition, STEM, and more. Through strong partnerships with local schools and volunteers, nearly 14,000 students were impacted, learning essential skills in agriculture, horticulture, food preparation, and nutrition.

The dedication of 4-H members, staff, and volunteers exemplifies the organization's motto: To Make the Best

Agriculture and Natural Resources: Educating Traditional and New Producers

The Agriculture and Natural Resources department engaged a diverse audience this year, from seasoned agricultural producers to first-time landowners. A key highlight was the 2024 Small and New Landowner Conference, which attracted 87 participants eager to learn about government agency partnerships, cottage food law, and North Texas land trends.

The department also achieved record participation at the 2024 Hay Clinic,

where more hav samples were tested than ever before. Additional Continuing Education Unit (CEU) programs included Feral Hog Control, Wheat Field Day, auarterly private applicator training. and the annual CEU Recertification event-helping landowners safely and effectively use pesticides.

Better Living for Texans (BLT): **Promoting Health and Nutrition**

The BLT program, designed for SNAPeligible adults and children, empowered participants to make healthier choices while maximizing resources.

- The Walk N Talk program, hosted at Flower Mound and Pilot Point Libraries, graduated 38 participants who learned about physical activity and better eating habits.
- The Learn, Grow, Eat, and Go program, in partnership with Lake Dallas and W.S. Ryan Elementary, taught 38 students gardening skills and healthy eating practices.
- The Growing and Nourishing Healthy Communities Garden Course, hosted with Emily Fowler and Little Elm Libraries, trained 55 participants on essential gardening techniques.

Family and Community Health: **Supporting Wellness Across Denton County**

The Family and Community Health unit welcomed 3 new Master Wellness Volunteers in 2024, bringing the active total to 6. Together, these volunteers logged 110 hours, delivering 34 nutrition education programs to 375 residents—a contribution valued at \$3,684.

Key achievements include:

- Walk Across Texas!: In partnership with Denton County HR, 192 employees collectively walked 30,417 miles in just 8 weeks.
- A Matter of Balance: Three series were held at THRIVE and Flower

Mound Senior Center, helping 30 seniors improve balance, flexibility, and prevent falls.

• Two Home Food Preservation Workshops focused on water bath canning for 16 participants, with plans to expand into pressure canning in 2025.

Master Gardeners and Master **Naturalists: Volunteers Drive Impact**

The Denton County Master Gardener and Master Naturalist programs reached incredible milestones in 2024. Combined, volunteers contributed over 59.000 hours of service—with Master Gardeners logging 31,000 hours and Master Naturalists 28,000. These programs reached 19,866 residents, including 6,880 contacts by Master Gardeners and 12,986 by Master Naturalists.

Recruiting and training new volunteers remains central to both organizations. Nearly 80 citizens completed rigorous 12-week intern training to become Master Volunteers, strengthening outreach and education across Denton County.

Recognizing Volunteer Contributions

In total, Denton County AgriLife volunteers contributed 76,707 hours of service in 2024. When valued at the Independent Sector's rate of \$33.49 per hour, this equates to an astounding \$2,568,917.43 given back to the community.

Denton ISD has selected Kascie Blough as the first principal of Hill Elementary School, which is slated to open August 2025 in the Braswell High School attendance zone.

Ms. Blough has most recently served as the assistant principal of Ashley Elementary in Frisco ISD since 2020. She has more than a decade of experience in education and will assume her role at Hill Elementary after Spring Break.

"Opening a new school in my community, one that will serve my neighborhood and my own children, is a dream come true," Ms. Blough said. "I will work tirelessly to build a learning community that finds joy and discovery every day. The opportunity to cultivate excitement from the first day we open is amazing."

Hill Elementary will be the 27th elementary school in Denton ISD and was funded from the 2023 capital improvement plan that was approved by district voters. The school is named for Fred Hill, who was the first African American male to serve on the Denton ISD Board of School Trustees.

Ms. Blough began her career in 2013 as a teacher in Carrollton–Farmers Branch ISD. From 2014–2020, Ms. Blough was a teacher in Frisco ISD. She has spent the last 12 years in Frisco ISD, and she was the Teacher of the Year in 2020.

While a teacher in Frisco ISD, Ms. Blough wrote, developed and implemented International Baccalaureate curriculum. In addition, she also led initiative–focused committees aimed at enhancing student experience, performance and community involvement.


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As the assistant principal at Ashley Elementary, Ms. Blough developed and oversaw the campus' safety and security plan. She also developed and

DENTON ISD GETS CONNECTED

Denton ISD Receives \$9 Million Grant to Provide Devices to Students with Limited Connectivity

Denton ISD was one of only two public school systems in the United States to receive a multi-million-dollar grant from the National Telecommunications and Information Administration (NTIA).

The \$9,027,400 grant will provide students with limited or no internet connectivity access to devices with internet access. In addition, these devices will also include browsing security protections, similar to those on the district network.

"I am very proud of the work that the Technology Department, in collaboration with the Grants Department, has done to pursue this opportunity," said Robert Pierce, Chief Technology Officer. "One of my top priorities is equity — I want all students to have the same technology-based opportunities, and this grant is a tremendous way to help us achieve that goal."

Denton ISD was one of only 24 entities from across the United States to receive the grant, and the district was one of only eight educational organizations to be awarded. This funding comes from the \$1.25 billion Digital Equity Competitive Grant Program, one of three Digital Equity Act grant programs created by the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law.

"Our partnership with NTIA aligns with our district's commitment to equitable opportunities for all students and helping to prepare them for success in higher education, workforce readiness or military service," said Dr. Susannah Holbert O'Bara, superintendent of schools. "While the addition of these funds will not defray any of our current budget deficit, they will ensure a safe and reliable learning environment for students who may not have had access to digital learning and resources previously."
